The Rabbi's Corner By Rabbinic Intern Ashley Barrett





t's amazing to me the power our tradition has. For generations, Jews across the world have been inspired by the simplest rituals, or the most elaborate liturgy to practice our faith with conviction and intention.

Some of those rituals and practices are easy for us, they maybe make a little bit more

sense than some practices.

And then, there are some pieces of our Jewish tradition that we just have to wrestle, with spiritually and intellectually, and even then, sometimes, they still don't make any sense!

Confession: for me, that's always been Tu B'shevat. Don't get me wrong, I LOVE the idea of celebrating the earth. Especially today as we see the effects of climate change devastating habitats and causing significant weather-related disasters. But why do we have to celebrate the earth at a time of year when it is least opportune to be outside enjoying it?

The Rabbis of the Talmud offer this wonderful teaching: Rabbi Yitzḥak said: A blessing is found only in an object that is hidden from the eye. We find the most wonderful blessings in the small miracles that are not always apparent. On Tu B'shevat we celebrate the miracles which are hidden in the innermost workings of nature.

As we move into 2022 I hope we all can celebrate those natural wonders and the small blessings in our lives which may often be hidden from our sight.

This book came recommended to us by friends and family both inside and outside of the Beth El Book Club, and it is a recommendation for which we are grateful. I often believe that there can be nothing new and nothing more in books or films about WWII that we – especially Jews – don't already know and have not already seen. I am always proven wrong, and once again I have learned about something I would never have known had Ms. Charles not written this book. The author has not revealed much about herself, but the accuracy of her settings in rural Montana and Paris come from her growing up in a tiny town in Montana and her residence in Paris.

There are two narrative periods in the book. One is in Paris from 1939 to 1944, the story of Odile Souchet, a bright young Parisenne who finds her dream job at the American Library in Paris from just before the War to the end of the Nazi occupation. The other is bright young Lily Jacobsen in a small town in Montana, and her four awkward years in high school from 1984 to 1988. Their lives intertwine when Lily intrudes on the reclusive "war bride" widow next door for help in writing a school report on France. The middle-aged widow and the yearning adolescent provide each other with healing from the wounds and errors in Odile's once young and Lily's currently young lives.

We enter Odile's family, led by her father, a superior police officer following Nazi regulations, and her fiancée, a young policeman following orders, and of her American Library "family" defying Nazi regulations and maintaining forbidden relations with their Jewish patrons. We enter Lily's family, shaken by her mother's death and her father's remarriage, and of her schoolmates, both allies and tormenters. While the struggles of a teenager seem minor compared with life under Nazi occupation, both women learn how a single act of betrayal or a single act of forgiveness can have significant consequences for evil or good. And we finally learn what brought Odile to the plains of Montana.



For us as Jewish readers, this book gives a look into a corner of the Shoah without having to immerse ourselves once again in the brutal details. And while both environments, Paris and rural Montana, are "foreign" to our experience, we see again how much we share in common as human beings with families and friends and communities. Please join us when we share our responses to this book.

Va-eira Nama I (God) Appeared [to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob] Exodus 6:2-9:35 January 1, 2022

Despite God's message that they will be redeemed from slavery, the Israelites' spirits remain crushed. God instructs Moses and Aaron to deliver the Israelites from the land of Egypt. (6:2-13)

The genealogy of Reuben, Simeon, Levi, and their descendants is recorded. (6:14-25)

Moses and Aaron perform a miracle with a snake and relate to Pharaoh God's message to let the Israelites leave Egypt. (7:8-13)

The first seven plagues occur. God hardens Pharaoh's heart, and Pharaoh rescinds each offer to let the Israelites go. (7:14-9:35)





Bo No Go [to Pharoah] Exodus 10:1-13:16 January 8, 2022

God sends the plagues of locusts and darkness upon Egypt and forewarns Moses about the final plague, the death of every Egyptian firstborn. Pharaoh still does not let the Israelites leave Egypt. (10:1-11:10)

God commands Moses and Aaron regarding the Passover festival. (12:1-27)

God enacts the final plague, striking down all the firstborn in the land of Egypt except those of the House of Israel. Pharaoh now allows the Israelites to leave. (12:29-42)

Speaking to Moses and Aaron, God repeats the commandments about Passover. (12:43-13:16)

Exodus 13:17-17:16 Sha

Shabbat Shira

January 15, 2022

The Children of Israel escape across the Sea of Reeds from Pharaoh and his army, who drown when God drives back the sea. (13:17-14:31)

Moses and the Israelites sing a song praising Adonai. (15:1-21)

In the wilderness, God provides the grumbling Israelites with quails and manna. God instructs the Israelites to gather and prepare on the sixth day food needed for Shabbat. (15:22-16:36)

The people complain about the lack of water. Moses hits a rock with his rod and brings forth water. (17:1-7)

Israel defeats Amalek, Israel's eternal enemy. God vows to blot out the memory of Amalek from the world. (17:8-16)





Yitro אַרָּרוֹי Jethro Exodus 18:1-20:23 January 22, 2022

Yitro brings his daughter Zipporah and her two sons, Gershom and Eliezer, to his son-in-law Moses. (18:1-12)

Moses follows Yitro's advice and appoints judges to help him lead the people. (18:13-27)

The Children of Israel camp in front of Mount Sinai. Upon hearing the covenant, the Israelites respond, "All that God has spoken we will do." (19:1-8)

After three days of preparation, the Israelites encounter God at Mount Sinai. (19:9-25)

God gives the Ten Commandments aloud directly to the people. (20:1-14)

Frightened, the Children of Israel ask Moses to serve as an intermediary between God and them. Moses tells the people not to be afraid. (20:15-18)

Interpersonal laws ranging from the treatment of slaves to the exhibition of kindness to strangers are listed. (21:1-23:9)

Cultic laws follow, including the commandment to observe the Sabbatical Year, a repetition of the Sabbath injunction, the first mention of the Three Pilgrimage Festivals, rules of sacrificial offerings, and the prohibition against boiling a kid in its mother's milk. (23:10-19)

The people assent to the covenant. Moses, Aaron, Nadab, Abihu, and seventy elders of Israel ascend the mountain and see God. Moses goes on alone and spends forty days on the mountain. (24:1-18)

<u>CANNABIS POLICY</u>- As our Members will be aware, the recreational use of Cannabis has been legalized by the Provincial Government as of October 17th, 2018. The Board of Directors considered the impact of this new legislation at their Board Meeting convened October 16th, 2018. At that time, the Board agreed that not only would the recreational use of Cannabis on Beth El property not be in keeping with the family values that Beth El aspires to, but the recreational use of Cannabis in public places is still prohibited, despite the new legislation. The Board accordingly unanimously agreed to prohibit the use of Cannabis on Beth El property, at all times. The Board asks that Members and their guests respect this decision and adhere to it fully.

WJCC Reopening Policy

In response to the new health instructions recently issued by the Windsor-Essex County Public Health Unit, the Windsor JCC's in-person hours have changed as of Monday December 13th, 2021. The WJCC building will now be open to the public from 9am-12pm on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, and will be closed to the public on Tuesdays and Thursdays. All WJCC staff will still be available by phone or e-mail throughout the week during regular business hours. Guests will be permitted to enter the building outside of these times if arranged in advance with a staff member or Jamie McCurdy. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact Dan Brotman at dan@jewishwindsor.org.

As part of our reopening, and with the support of our Board, we will be adhering to all provincial health regulations, including indoor mask-wearing. Above and beyond provincial regulations, we announce the following new requirement:

- In an effort to reduce the risk of exposure to COVID-19 and its variants, as of November 1st, 2021, proof of double-vaccination will be required to be shown at the front desk for any member, visitor, or guest (ages 12+) to access the WJCC premises.
- Proof of double-vaccination is the receipt or other documentation (appbased, digital photo, or hard copy) indicating the date of your second vaccine dose. An individual is considered fully vaccinated 14 days from that date. Proof of your vaccination can be downloaded from the Ontario Ministry of Health.

Please enter the building using the front door on Ouellette Avenue, where at the front desk you will be asked to write down your name, time of entry and contact number.

If you have previously shown your proof of vaccination at the front desk, you will be verified as fully vaccinated in our system and will not be required to show proof of vaccination in the future. If you need assistance entering the building or cannot enter through the front door, please call the WJCC at 519-973-1772.
