The Rabbi's Corner

I love the excitement of spring. Something about the sunshine and the crisp air makes me feel a deep sense of anticipation for what's next. Passover is always entwined with spring and feelings of joy.

Later this month Jews around the world will gather together around a table and tell the story of our Exodus from Egypt. We are instructed by our sages to clean all the chametz from our homes. Some take this

literally to mean they must throw out (or donate) all of their unwanted chametz, while others simply leave it sitting in a cupboard during the festival. As we prepare for Passover this year how are each of us dealing with the chametz in our lives? How are we casting out the physical and metaphorical unwanted things as we move into the coming month and the coming season? How can we find joy and newness in this process of removing unnecessary things from our lives?

I leave you to reflect on these questions. Below are the words of Alden Solovy, Reform Liturgist, his words offer a prayer for spring.

For Spring by Alden Solovy
Shimmering, radiant air
Alive with new warmth.
Sunshine waking the earth,
Calling the grasses to grow,
Bulbs to prepare flowers.
Winds clear the last remnants of seasons past,
Old leaves and dry branches

Making way for new life.

And the rain joins the sun to feed the land.

Bless this day, G-d of seasons.

Bless the Spring with energy and hope.

Be present with us as we celebrate the glory of creation

Planting the land and our lives with Your gifts,

These gardens of holiness and love.

G-d of time and space,

May this season be a blessing and a teacher.

Make me like the sunshine, a source of light.

Make me like the earth, a source of bounty, ready to give.

Bless my days with service and my nights with peace.

Make me like a garden,

A source of beauty and purpose,

The Jewish spring festival celebrating freedom and family as we remember the Exodus from Egypt more than 3,000 years ago

April 15-22, 2022

PASSOVER'S ORIGINS

Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is a major Jewish spring festival celebrating freedom and family as we remember the Exodus from Egypt more than 3,000 years ago. The main observances of this holiday center around a special home service called the seder, which includes a festive meal, the prohibition on eating chametz, and the eating of matzah.

On the 15th day of Nisan in the Hebrew calendar, Jews gather with family and friends in the evening to read from a book called the Haggadah, meaning "telling," which contains the order of prayers, rituals, readings, and songs for the Passover seder. The Haggadah helps us retell the events of the Exodus, so that each generation may learn and remember this story that is so central to Jewish life and history.

Passover is celebrated for either seven or eight days, depending on family and communal custom. In Israel and for most Reform Jews around the world, Passover is seven days, but for many other Jews, it is eight days.

The holiday of Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is perhaps one of the most central to Jewish life and history. More widely observed than any other holiday, Passover celebrates the biblical account of the Israelites' redemption and escape from 400 years of Egyptian slavery. Holiday rituals include a dramatic retelling of the Exodus story and many unique food traditions. We come together with friends and family to celebrate the great lessons of the story: the blessing of freedom and the reminder that since we were once slaves and were freed, it is our responsibility to work for freedom for all people, everywhere.

The word "Passover" is derived from the Hebrew word pasach, which means "passed over," referring to the 10th plague that killed the Egyptian firstborn, but miraculously "passed over" the houses of the Israelites (more on that below).

HISTORY OF THE CELEBRATION


The Torah commands us to observe Passover for seven days. Many Jews in North America and in Israel follow this injunction, but some outside Israel celebrate for eight days. The additional day was added to Passover and other holidays around 700-600 B.C.E. to guard against a possible error because elaborate networks of mountaintop bonfires were used to signal holidays' beginnings. Although today's dependable calendar allows us to know when holidays start and end. the eight-day celebration remains ingrained in law and practice for some Jews outside Israel.

Celebrated in various ways throughout history, Passover incorporates remnants of ancient spring harvest festivals. When the Temple existed, the holiday was one of three major festivals that required pilgrimages to Jerusalem to bring sacrifices. After the destruction of the Second Temple, Passover became a more communal, home-centered holiday, with the Haggadah and the seder as we know them mostly finalized around 500-600 C.E.

Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El



The Un-Americans by Molly Antopol



In a change from the novels and analytical books we have been reading in the recent past, our next book is a collection of eight stories spanning the entire Ashkenazi Jewish universe from New York to Belarus to Israel to Los Angeles. This is the source of the collection's title: "the characters are "un-Americans" because they are immigrants or have been accused of un-American activity or simply don't feel American." Although the stories are all about Jewish families, they also have universality. As Antopol defines it, to be "un-American" means to lack a sense of belonging and being rooted in America; the immigrant experience is being neither here nor theme. Because of the depth of her character development, many of stories possess the richness of novel. Every reader will find all, or certainly most of the stories a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

In the first story, "The Old World," the narrator Howard Siegel, who owns dry cleaning stores in New York City and whose wife has left him, falls instantly for the tragically widowed Ukrainian Svetlana Gumbar, but their honeymoon in Ukraine is a disaster as they recognize the cultural abyss of their experiences. When the story was written a decade ago, who would have imagined that Ukraine would be news item number one? As we contemplate the more than a million refugees fleeing Ukraine today, this story gives us a new insight into what it must mean. In the final story, "Retrospective", the death of Eva Kaplan, a wealthy, much-celebrated art collector in Jerusalem, stirs up deep conflicts for her daughter and grandchildren. When she dies, this beloved philanthropist leaves nothing for her family in Boston, instead creating a charitable foundation in her own name. This withholding of money is painful for her daughter, Fran, who recalls how neglectful Eva was as a mother: "Always flying out to Europe, or lunching with some refugee scholar. Always

- always - letting everyone know just how generous she was." Today, with news items about the "generosity" of Jewish oligarchs, pharmaceutical exploiters and Ponzi schemers, we can read it with new meaning. The six stories in between deal with a grandmother's tale of her escape from a Nazi ghetto through the sewers and her life as a partisan, a young journalist not meeting her family's career expectations, a victim of the McCarthy witch hunt and his son, young brothers on an Israeli moshav after the injury of the dominant brother, and a floundering academic who had been a hero of the Czech anti-communist resistance. A wonderful mixture.





We read that a "mixed multitude" of people fled Egypt with the Israelites. With no time to wait, they took the cakes from their oven before they had time to rise. By God's mighty hand, our ancestors fled the house of bondage and were brought to "a land flowing with milk and honey." As a reminder of God's redemption, we are instructed to eat only unleavened bread during Passover. Furthermore, the text tells us to explain to our children, "It is because of what God did for me when I went free from Egypt." The Hebrew word for explain, v'higgadta, has the same root as Haggadah, the book from which we read on Passover. In doing so, each year we fulfill the sacred obligation to tell this story to our children. It is this story, more than any other that is central to Judaism. God redeemed us from slavery and we therefore know the heart of the stranger.
