I am so excited to meet and get to know each of you. Please don't hesitate to reach out!

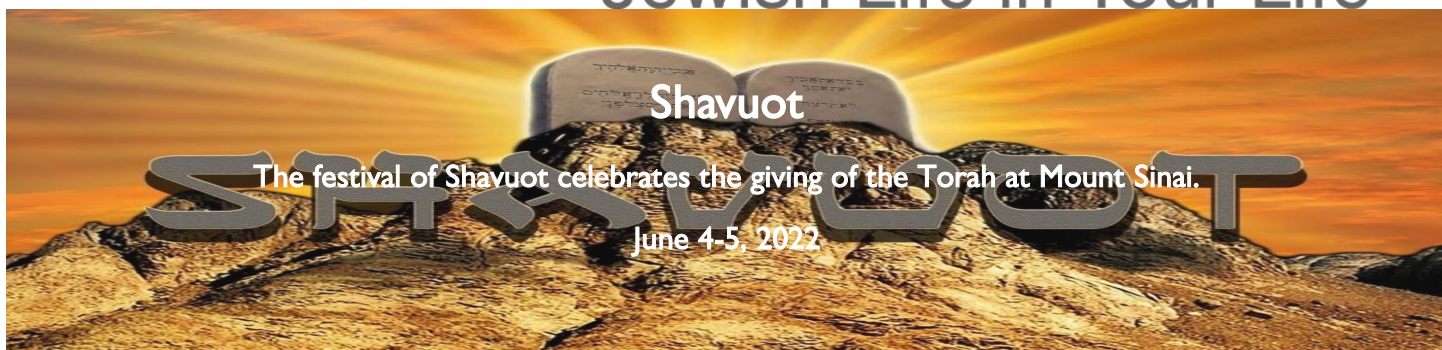

SHAVUOT'S ORIGINS

The festival of Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and encourages us to embrace the Torah's teachings and be inspired by the wisdom Jewish tradition has to offer.

Shavuot is the Hebrew word for “weeks,” and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. Shavuot, like many other Jewish holidays, began as an ancient agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life.

SHAVUOT HISTORY

Shavuot, which has become known as the Festival of the Giving of the Torah, was originally a harvest holiday. Along with Sukkot and Passover, it is one of the Shalosh Regalim (Three Pilgrimage Festivals), during which people gathered at the Temple in Jerusalem with their agricultural offerings.

In the time of the Temple in Jerusalem, the ancient Israelites brought their first fruits (first harvest of their crop) to the Temple to offer to God at Shavuot, 49 days after Passover. (The name Shavuot, literally “weeks,” symbolizes the completion of this seven-week period.) In Leviticus 23:21, the Torah commands: “And you shall proclaim that day to be a holy convocation!”

After the Temple was destroyed and the Israelites could no longer bring the first fruits of their harvest as offerings, Talmudic rabbis reframed the holiday. The Rabbis ascribed Shavuot to the biblical story which recounts how, after the Exodus from Egypt, the Israelites proceeded to Mount Sinai in the desert. Moses ascended the mountain to meet God, who gave him the Ten Commandments, which were written on two tablets to be delivered to the Israelites.

Based on the Torah’s description of when the Israelites arrived at Mount Sinai after the Exodus from Egypt (Exodus 19:1), the Rabbis set the date of the giving of the Torah as 6th day of the Hebrew month of Sivan, and the holiday that was once purely agricultural became the commemoration of the Israelites receiving the Torah at Mount Sinai. Today, even as we remember its agricultural roots, the holiday allows us to celebrate the Torah, education, and the wisdom that Jewish teachings have to offer us.

Shavuot is known by several names: Chag HaShavuot (the Festival of Weeks), Chag HaBikkurim (the Festival of the First Fruits), Z’man Matan Torateinu (the Time of the Giving of Our Torah), and Chag HaKatzir (the Festival of Reaping). Some Ashkenazi Jews may pronounce and write the name of the holiday as “Shavuos.”

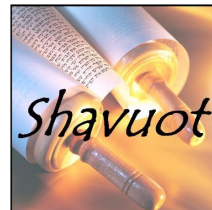

We will talk soon.

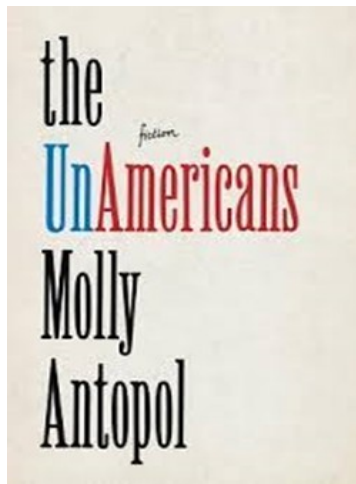

The Un-Americans by Molly Antopol



Postponed for a month while I continued my recovery from a coronary double-bypass in April, we will meet again on June 8th to discuss our responses to Molly Antopol's 2014 literary success, *THE UN-AMERICANS*. This collection of short stories received a whole bunch of literary awards at that time both from Jewish literary societies (e.g. the Hadassah Fiction Award) and other literary groups (e.g. the National Book Award). And although since then she is currently holding a teaching fellowship at Stanford University and has held the Radcliffe Institute Fellowship at Harvard University, she has not yet published her second book – a novel-in-progress titled *THE AFTER PARTY*. It will be set in Israel during the immigration wave in the early 1990s, and will tell the tale of a marriage between two people swept up by the forces of history and the destructive power of ambition. I eagerly await her next book because I liked this one so much.

I am really disappointed that I was unable to find much current material on her life and career. In 2014, the year that *THE UN-AMERICANS* was published to such great success, she was 35 years old: an upcoming young writer. Now she is 42, with added maturity. She grew up in Los Angeles, received her BA in creative writing from the University of California, Santa Cruz, and her MFA from Columbia University. I have no idea whether she is still married to her Israeli husband, Chanan Tigay, or anything else that is personal. Tigay is teaching and writing in the USA, but his Internet information says nothing about Molly Antopol. I confess that I want to know these things the same way a fan of a pop star wants to know, but that is just to let you know how much I liked *THE UN-AMERICANS*. You can read past Book Club page if you would like to refresh your memory of the content of the book, but take my word for it that this is a book you will be glad to read.

(Proverbs 3:17-18)

B'midbar במדבר In the Wilderness Numbers 1:1-4:20 June 4, 2022

God commands Moses to take a census of all the Israelite males over the age of twenty. (1:1-46)
The duties of the Levites, who are not included in the census, are detailed. (1:47-51)
Each tribe is assigned specific places in the camp around the Tabernacle. (1:52-2:34)
The sons of Levi are counted and their responsibilities are set forth. (3:1-3:39)
A census of the firstborn males is taken and a special redemption tax is levied on them. (3:40-51)
God instructs Moses and Aaron regarding the responsibilities of Aaron and his sons, and the duties assigned to the Kohathites. (4:1-20)



Naso נשא Take a Census Numbers 4:21-7:89 June 11, 2022

A census of the Gershonites, Merarites, and Koathites between the ages of thirty and fifty is conducted and their duties in the Tabernacle are detailed. (4:21-49)
God speaks to Moses concerning what to do with ritually unclean people, repentant individuals, and those who are suspected of adultery. (5:1-31)
The obligations of a nazirite vow are explained. They include abstaining from alcohol and not cutting one's hair. (6:1-21)
God tells Moses how to teach Aaron and his sons the Priestly Blessing. (6:22-27)
Moses consecrates the Sanctuary, and the tribal chieftains bring offerings. Moses then speaks with God inside the Tent of Meeting. (7:1-89)



B'haalot'cha בהעלותך When You Raise [the Lamps] Numbers 8:1-12:16 June 18, 2022

God speaks to Moses, describing the menorah for the Tent of Meeting. The Levites are appointed to serve as assistants under Aaron and his sons. (8:1-26)
Those who are unable to celebrate Passover during Nisan are given a time in the month of Sivan to observe a "second Passover." (9:1-14)
A cloud by day and fire by night show God's Presence over the Tabernacle. When the cloud lifts from the Tabernacle, the people leave Sinai, setting out on their journey, tribe by tribe. (9:15-10:36)
The Israelites complain about the lack of meat, and Moses becomes frustrated. God tells him to appoint a council of elders. God provides the people with meat and then strikes them with a very severe plague. (11:1-34)
Miriam and Aaron talk about the "Cushite woman" whom Moses has married. In addition, they complain that God speaks not only through Moses but also through them. Miriam is struck with leprosy, and Moses begs God to heal her. After her recovery, the people resume their journey. (12:1-16)



Sh'lach L'cha שלח-לך Send [Notables to Scout the Land] Numbers 13:1-15:41

June 25, 2022

Moses sends twelve spies to the Land of Israel to report on the inhabitants and the country. Despite the positive report of Joshua and Caleb, the people are frightened. (13:1-14:10)

God threatens to wipe out the Children of Israel but relents when Moses intercedes on their behalf. To punish the people, God announces that all those who left Egypt would not enter the Land of Israel except for Joshua and Caleb. (14:11-45)

Moses instructs the Israelites regarding setting aside challah, the observance of the Sabbath, how to treat strangers, and the laws of tzitzit. (15:1-41)



weekly TORAH



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(Proverbs 3:17-18)

Korach קָרַח Korach Numbers 16:1–18:32 July 2, 2022

Korach and his followers, Dathan and Abiram, lead a rebellion against the leadership of Moses and Aaron. God punishes the rebels by burying them and their families alive. Once again, God brings a plague on the people. (16:1-17:15)

The chief of each tribe deposits his staff inside the Tent of Meeting. Aaron's staff brings forth sprouts, produces blossoms, and bears almonds. (17:16-26)

The Kohanim and Levites are established and assigned the responsibility of managing the donations to the Sanctuary. All of the firstborn offerings shall go to the priests and all the tithes are designated for the Levites in return for the services they perform. (18:1-32)



Chukat חֻקֹּת The Ritual Law Numbers 19:1-22:1 July 9, 2022

The laws of the red heifer to purify a person who has had contact with a corpse are given. (19:1-22)

The people arrive at the wilderness of Zin. Miriam dies and is buried there. (20:1)

The people complain that they have no water. Moses strikes the rock to get water for them. God tells Moses and Aaron they will not enter the Land of Israel. (20:2-13)

The king of Edom refuses to let the Children of Israel pass through his land. After Aaron's priestly garments are given to his son Eleazer, Aaron dies. (20:14-29)

After they are punished for complaining about the lack of bread and water, the Israelites repent and are victorious in battle against the Amorites and the people of Bashan, whose lands they capture. (21:4-22:1)



Balak בָּלָק Balak Numbers 22:2-25:9 July 16, 2022

Balak, the king of Moab, persuades the prophet Balaam to curse the Israelites so that he can defeat them and drive them out of the region. However, Balaam blesses the Children of Israel instead and prophesies that Israel's enemies will be defeated. (22:2-24:25)

God punishes the Israelites with a plague for consorting with the Moabite women and their god. The plague is stayed after Pinchas kills an Israelite man and his Midianite woman. (25:1-9)



Pinchas פִּינָחָס Phinehas Numbers 25:10-30:1 July 23, 2022

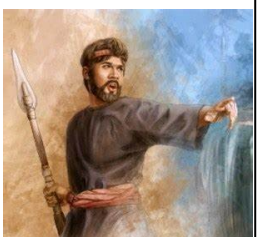
Pinchas is rewarded for killing the Israelite and the Midianite woman who cursed God. (25:10–15)

Israel fights a war against the Midianites. (25:16-18)

A second census is taken. (26:1–65)

The daughters of Zelophehad force a change in the laws of property inheritance. (27:1–11)

Joshua is chosen to be Moses' successor. (27:15–23)



Matot-Mas'ei מַטֵּי - מַסְעֵי The Tribes / The Marches of [the Israelites]

Numbers 30:2-36:13 July 30, 2022

Moses explains to the Israelites the laws concerning vows made by men and women. (30:2–17)

Israel wages war against the Midianites. (31:1–18)

The laws regarding the spoils of war are outlined. (31:19–54)

The tribes of Reuben and Gad are granted permission to stay on the east bank of the Jordan River. (32:1–42)

The itinerary of the Israelites through the wilderness from Egypt to Jordan is delineated. (33:1-49)

Moses tells Israel to remove the current inhabitants of the land that God will give them and to destroy their gods. (33:50-56)

The boundaries of the Land of Israel are defined, along with those of the Levitical cities and the cities of refuge. (34:1-35:15)

God makes a precise distinction between murder and manslaughter. (35:16-34)

The laws of inheritance as they apply to Israelite women are delineated. (36:1-13)

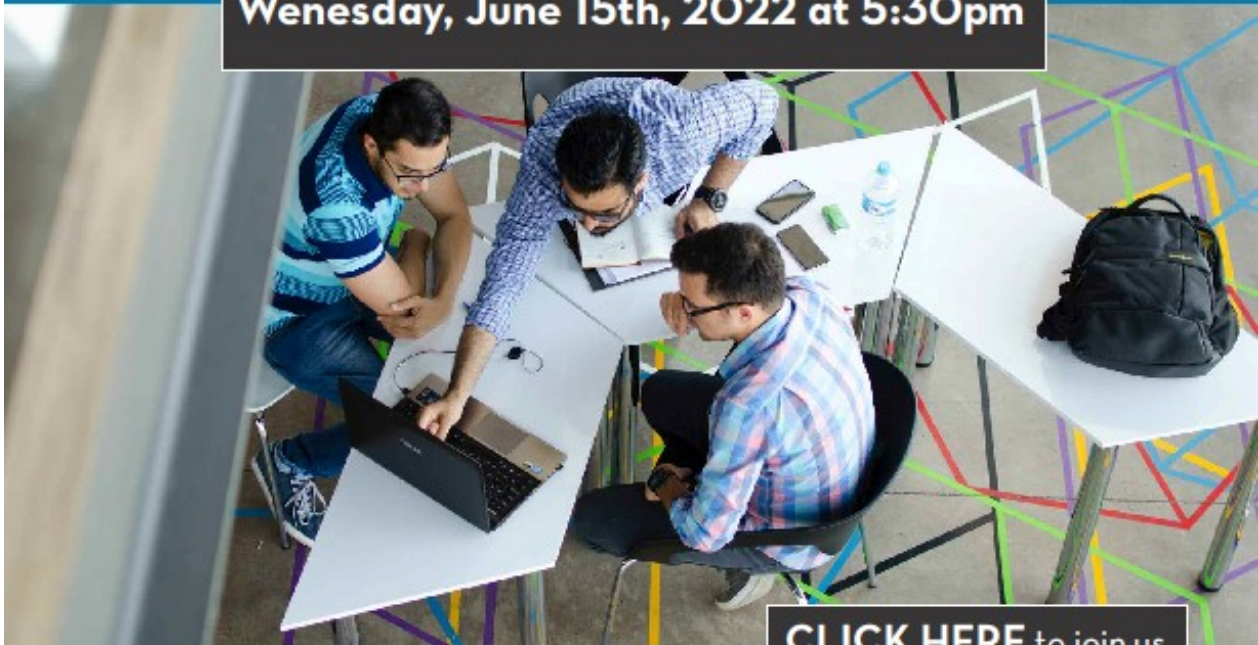
