Here is a bit about me: I grew up in Lansing, Michigan and served in the US Air Force as an officer for 7 years in Texas, Georgia, Iraq, and as a Professor of Aerospace Studies at Michigan State University. Upon leaving the Air Force I moved to Montana where I felt a strong call to go to seminary and become a Cantor. After nearly seven years of training, I will be ordained as a Hazzan this coming January through the Cantorial program with ALEPH: Alliance for Jewish Renewal.

Over the past year I have served as a Student Cantor leading services at Congregation Shaarey Zedek in Southfield, Michigan, and as a teacher of tefillah at Beth Israel Congregation in Ann Arbor. I am committed to leading engaging and meaningful Shabbat and Holiday services, growing your Religious School, and deepening our understanding of Torah and our Jewish faith and traditions in Adult Education programs. Additionally, it is my sincere prayer that I will provide a warm, helpful, and caring presence for your lifecycle and pastoral needs, and that I can represent you well to the greater Windsor community.

At home I am married to Jim, and we are parents to 4 teenagers/young adults (whoa!): Ethan (21), Ryan (19), Ellie (17), and Sophianna (14). We also live with 3 dogs, 4 cats, 30 chickens, 8 ducks, and 2 geese. (To be clear, the fowl live outside.)

From the President,

It has been a busy month since our AGM in June.

At that time we were committed to Rabbinical student Madeline Budman, as well as looking into the recruitment of part-time spiritual leader Devorah Tucker-Fick.

Once we committed to moving forward with Devorah, we had an obligation to notify Madeline about this development. We had conversations with Madeline, who in turn discussed our plans with her supervisor at HUC. While Rabbi Schwartz at HUC acknowledged that this was a positive direction for Beth El, she ultimately made the decision that Madeline's placement with Beth El was no longer viable.

Although we were disappointed with the HUC decision, it provided us with the opportunity to increase Devorah's time commitment with Beth El.

Devorah will commit an average of 20 hours/week to Beth El. This will include high holiday services, 2-3 Friday night services/month, other holidays, religious school, bar/bat mitzvah tutoring, Torah study, and more.

I had a meeting with Tracey yesterday. She is excited to collaborate with Devorah! We are planning a welcoming service to showcase Tracey and Devorah together, date to be determined. We are also planning other opportunities in August for smaller groups to meet Devorah.

Devorah's focus for the summer is working with Gabriella on religious school curriculum and working with Tracey to plan the HHD.

Devorah and her husband are currently looking for rental accommodations in Windsor (2 bedrooms, price point ~ \$1300/month).

This will allow Devorah to have her own place during the part weeks that she is in town, and also give her family the flexibility of being here with her. If you know of anything available, please let Sarah know.

Thank you for your support in making this happen! We are looking forward to a great year!





Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El



A Broken Hallelujah by Liel Leibovitz



Two years before Leonard Cohen's death in 2016, this book by Liel Leibovitz, who teaches media and culture at New York University, took readers on a deep dive through the cardinal spiritual themes that have informed Cohen's work for six decades. From Cohen's last years of performing, Leibovitz loops back to 1930s Montreal, where Cohen was born into a prosperous family descended from some of the city's most prominent Jewish figures. Throughout it all, Leibovitz writes, Cohen has been "a poet whose words, like the chants of Gregorian monks, seem designed to attract the attention of some higher power. That preoccupation was redemption. And for evidence one need look no further than "Hallelujah," which Cohen recorded in 1984 and which has gone on to become one of the most popular songs of all time. Leibovitz locates "Hallelujah" within Cohen's lifelong personal and professional enterprise: an inquiry into faith and spiritual selfhood grounded in the tenets of Judaism, tempered by Buddhist meditative practices and animated by Cohen's

own belief in the power of "art, love, friendship, kindness, music [and] sex."

Why was it that Leonard Cohen received the sort of reverence we reserve for a precious few living artists? These are the questions at the heart of A Broken Hallelujah, a meditation on the singer, his music, and the ideas and beliefs at its core. Granted extraordinary access to Cohen's personal papers, Liel Leibovitz examines the intricacies of a complex man. For instance, Cohen was described as a Sabbath-observant Jew in an article in The New York Times, keeping the Sabbath even while on tour and performing for Israeli troops during the 1973 Arab-Israeli war. He was well known by then, after Judy Collins introduced him to television audiences during one of her shows in 1966.

Cohen died on November 7, 2016, at the age of 82 at his home in Los Angeles; As was his wish, Cohen was laid to rest with a Jewish rite, in a simple pine casket, in a family plot in the Congregation Shaar Hashomayim cemetery on Mount Royal. Since then, citizens and officials in Montreal have honored him by naming a street and other locations, including a library, after him. More than just an account of Cohen's life, A Broken Hallelujah is an intimate look at the artist that is as emotionally astute as it is philosophically observant. Delving into the sources and meaning of Cohen's



work, Leibovitz beautifully illuminates what Cohen is telling us and why we listen so intensely.

The Words

Deuteronomy 1:1-3:22

August 6 2022

Moses begins his final words of instruction to the Children of Israel, focusing first on recounting their physical journey. (1:1–21)

Moses reviews the people's reactions to the negative reports of the spies and the appointment of Joshua to succeed him. (1:22-45)

Moses recounts that all of the Israelite warriors who left Egypt died, as God had intended, and the people continued their wanderings and defeated their enemies. (2:14-3:11)

Moses reiterates that the Land of Israel was allocated to the Israelite tribes. (3:12-22)

[Moses] Pleaded with the Eternal

Deuteronomy 3:23-7:11

August 13, 2022

Moses pleads with God to let him enter the Land of Israel with the people, but God once more refuses his request. (3:23-28)

Moses orders the Children of Israel to pay attention and follow the laws given by God in order to be worthy of the land they are about to receive. (4:1-40)

Specific areas of the land are set aside to serve as cities of refuge. (4:41-43)

The covenant at Sinai and the Ten Commandments are recalled. Once again, the people are exhorted to heed God's commandments. (5:1-30)

Moses speaks the words of the Sh'ma, the credo of Judaism, and commands Israel to show their love for Adonai and keep God's laws and ordinances. (6:1-25)

Moses warns the people not to commit idolatry by worshiping the gods of the nations they will conquer in Israel. (7:1-11)

[And if You] Obey [These Rules] Deuteronomy 7:12-11:25

August 20, 2022

Moses tells the Israelites that if they follow God's laws, the nations who now dwell across the Jordan River will not harm them. (7:12-26)

Moses reminds the people of the virtues of keeping God's commandments. He also tells them that they will dispossess those who now live in the Land only because they are idolatrous, not because the Israelites are uncommonly virtuous. Thereupon, Moses reviews all of the trespasses of the Israelites against God. (8:1-10:11)

Moses says that the Land of Israel will overflow with milk and honey if the people obey God's commandments and teach them to their children. (10:12-11:25)

Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17

August 27, 2022

Re'eh

God places both blessing and curse before the Israelites. They are taught that blessing will come through the observance of God's laws. (11:26-32)

Moses' third discourse includes laws about worship in a central place (12:1-28); injunctions against idolatry (12:29-13:19) and self-mutilation (14:1-2); dietary rules (14:3-21); and laws about tithes (14:22-25), debt remission (15:1-11), the release and treatment of Hebrew slaves (15:12-18), and firstlings (15:19-23).

Moses reviews the correct sacrifices to be offered during the Pilgrim Festivals—Pesach, Sukkot, and Shavuot. (16:1-17)

At that time, the Board agreed that not only would the recreational use of Cannabis on Beth El property not be in keeping with the family values that Beth El aspires to, but the recreational use of Cannabis in public places is still prohibited, despite the new legislation.
