Clergy Corner Hazzan Devorah Tucker-Fick

This is the eighth year in a row that I have taken on the spiritual practice of reciting Psalm 27 daily during the months of *Elul* and *Tishrei*, completing the practice on *Hoshana Rabbah*, the 7th day of *Sukkot*—a total of 51 days.

One verse consistently speaks to me louder than the others, year after year; verse 14: "Wait on God. Be of good courage, and God shall strengthen your heart. And wait, I say, on God."

It seems that every year I am waiting on God for something different. The first year I engaged in this practice, I was a widowed mother of two young children, waiting on God to help me to create a new life, trusting that despite the loss of all I had assumed for my future, God still had a plan for me. That year Psalm 27:14 left me with the belief that if I walked with courage, if I just put one foot in front of the other, my heart would be strengthened and healed.

A few years later I was newly remarried, busy blending a family that included two step-children. Verse 14 gave me the courage that God could not only strengthen my heart, but also expand its size so that I would have room in it to love these two children, who had lost

The year after that I was pregnant with twins—the children of friends who had struggled for years with the grief and brokenness of infertility. My due date was, in fact, *Hoshana Rabbah*: I journeyed through Psalm 27 knowing that my friends had waited for years on God, and that their hearts would not only be strengthened, but would be healed and filled as they welcomed their baby boys into their home.

their mother to cancer, as my own.

I do not yet know what this Psalm 27 journey has for me this year—as you read this we are only a few days into Elul. My hope is that perhaps it will not be a journey of my own undertaking, but that you will walk it with me: I ask you to reflect during this time on what it is to "wait on God" and to consider what it might take for all of us to "be of good courage" as we journey into our first year together. My prayer for us is that through this time of Holy Days, we, the Beth El community, will find that God has indeed strengthened our hearts and prepared us for the blessings to come in 5783.


Children's Books available

Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El



A Broken Hallelujah by Liel Leibovitz



In late December 1964, Leonard Cohen gave a memorable speech entitled "Loneliness and History" at the Jewish Library in Montreal. Cohen spoke that night about his admiration for men in the ancient Hebrew tradition who were both priests and prophets at the same time. He concluded by defending the abstract idea of a Jewish community and its ancient traditions. In his new book *A Broken Hallelujah: Rock and Roll, Redemption, and the Life of Leonard Cohen*, Liel Leibovitz says this was a seminal moment in Cohen's career: transforming a young experimental artist into a dedicated troubadour who spent his career hell-bent on telling the truth. From the start Leibovitz makes it clear that this is not a biography but an insight into what gave direction to the singer's moral compass. Speaking with Cohen's friends and colleagues; mining the singer's letters, notebooks, and interviews; and drawing on scholarly commentary that ranges from Plato, Jewish liturgy and Old

Testament theologians to Hannah Arendt, Manny Farber and John Milton, Leibovitz has produced a lively, erudite and affecting exegesis of Cohen's work, both lyrically and as a creative process that has been notoriously painstaking, if not outright painful.

Just as Cohen's life and career was so much different from almost every other popular artist, so is the career of the author of this book. Liel Leibovitz (born 1976) is an Israeli journalist, author, media critic and video game scholar. He was born in Tel Aviv, immigrated to the United States in 1999, and before moving to New York City, was a non-commissioned officer in the Spokesperson's Unit of the Israel Defense Forces. After serving, he attended film school at Tel Aviv University. In New York. He worked at the Israeli Consulate as a senior press officer, then went back to school and received an M.S. in journalism and a Ph.D. in communications from Columbia University.

When Cohen died in 2016 at the age of 82, I thought to myself that he was just my age, and too young to leave this earth. I bought my first Cohen record album in Saskatoon, and was captivated by his voice as well as his lyrics, so profound and even mysterious. The Beth El Book Club will have a wonderful meeting discussing the book and sharing our own connections to Montreal's gift to the music of our lives.
