Clergy Corner Hazzan Devorah Tucker-Fick

I am always struck that the joy and feasting of *Rosh Hashanah* turns so quickly to the introspection and fasting of *Yom Kippur*.

Oh, the fast.

We are Jews, so we do these things: we stop drinking and eating, we deny carnal relations, and some of us even go without our shoes! But just when we think we should be good with G-d on the holiest day of the year, just at the point in the day when it really starts becoming difficult, we are chastised in our *Haftarah*. "None of this is working because *you're not fasting right*."

G-d's voice cuts through the hunger and the thirst and rings through the sanctuary: "Is such the fast I desire, a day for people to starve their bodies...bowing their heads like a bulrush...lying in sackcloth and ashes? Do you call that a fast?"

Well, I have to say that I've fasted on Yom Kippur many times, and yes, I call that a fast.

Yet I think I understand what G-d is getting at here. We are called to go deeper, to realize that fasts of physical needs only scratch the surface of what is actually a much deeper spiritual matter.

Fasting our bodies is merely the first step in the fasting of the soul—what this year I am going to call Soul Fasting.

Fasting our bodies is the preliminary step which readies us for the real work: the sacrifices we are asked to make in our lives for greater purpose. *Soul Fasting* is indeed so much more than denying ourselves of food and drink and sex and shoes; it is learning to surrender the shields we put up, to permit others to see who we truly are. *Soul Fasting* requires radical vulnerability, radical shedding of the ego, radical honesty. It demands radical financial and material sacrifice to feed the hungry and heal the sick, and radical concession of our time and energy so that we can truly listen and show empathy and compassion to those we encounter in our daily lives.

That is what G-d asks of us: to fast in preparation of letting go and clearing the way, to come to terms with our own self-importance, accomplishments, and the image we maintain for the world.

Fasting—denying our bodies—is not what G-d ultimately desires! Rather, fasting is the method G-d has instructed us in so that we can experience beyond the physical and reach to the depths of our souls, where the life-giving part of us resides. In that depth, we may find we can become who G-d calls us to be—to "clear the way," to make real changes in our lives, and remove obstacles that prevent connection, honesty, vulnerability and giving over of our lives to our true purpose.

This year may your fast be one of the soul, and as you hear the final blast of the *shofar* on *Yom Kippur*, may you remember that it is your breath which brings life to the *shofar*, and it is your voice that brings Divine music to the world.

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

Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El





Most of our recent books have been quite personal – memoirs or novels – but now we will turn to a book asking the big questions in our world today and offering some interesting answers. Certainly not the ultimate answers, but thoughtful and challenging answers. Why is liberal democracy in crisis? Is God back? Is a new world war coming? What does the rise of Donald Trump signify? What can we do about the epidemic of fake news? Which civilization dominates the world – the West, China, Islam? Should Europe keep its doors open to immigrants? Can nationalism solve the problems of inequality and climate change? What should we do about terrorism? What should we teach our kids?

With questions that big, we must ask who this guy is. Yuval Noah Harari is an Israeli, one of three children born to a secular Jewish family with roots in Lebanon and Eastern Europe. Harari first specialized in medieval history and military history in his studies from 1993 to 1998 at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and completed a D.Phil. degree at Jesus College, Oxford. Yuval Noah Harari's career is a publishing miracle: an obscure Israeli academic wrote a Hebrew-language history of humanity *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind.* Translated into English in 2014, the book sold more than a million copies. His next book, *Homo Deus: A Brief History of Tomorrow*, was another great success, and after his book on the past and the future, he wrote and we will be reading, *21 Lessons for the 21st Century*, which deals with the present.

Harari writes: "For millennia, much of what passed for 'news' and 'facts' in human social networks were stories about miracles, angels, demons, and witches with bold reporters giving live coverage from the deepest pits of the underworld. ... When a thousand people believe some made-up story for one month, that's fake news. When a billion people believe it for a thousand years, that's a religion." Harari shows immense ambition in his intellectual enterprises and this effort is no exception. As he explains, "My agenda here is global. I look at the major forces that shape societies all over the world and that are likely to influence the future of our planet as a whole." Bill Gates commented in an article in the *New York Times:* "Harari is such a stimulating writer that even when I disagreed, I wanted to



keep reading and thinking. All three of his books wrestle with some version of the same question: What will give our lives meaning in the decades and centuries ahead?" Join us to discuss this next month.

October 15, 2022

On the Shabbat during Sukkot, we are reminded of the age-old desire to know God. Moses implores God to let him see God. While God will not allow Moses to see God's face, God tells Moses, "I will make My goodness pass before you..." Perhaps we experience the divine presence through the goodness we create in the world. The Torah then sets forth the thirteen attributes of God, among them that God is compassionate, gracious, slow to anger and abounding in kindness. By emulating these very attributes, we create the goodness which allows us to know God.

People start to build a city and the Tower of Babel. God scatters the people and gives them different languages to speak. (11:1-9)

The ten generations from Noah to Abram are listed. (11:10-29:2)

<u>CANNABIS POLICY</u>- As our Members will be aware, the recreational use of Cannabis has been legalized by the Provincial Government as of October 17th, 2018. The Board of Directors considered the impact of this new legislation at their Board Meeting convened October 16th, 2018. At that time, the Board agreed that not only would the recreational use of Cannabis on Beth El property not be in keeping with the family values that Beth El aspires to, but the recreational use of Cannabis in public places is still prohibited, despite the new legislation. The Board accordingly unanimously agreed to prohibit the use of Cannabis on Beth El property, at all times. The Board asks that Members and their guests respect this decision and adhere to it fully.
