Clergy Corner Hazzan Devorah Tucker-Fick

elcome to the month of Cheshvan: the month of holidaylessness.

As a child I realized that there was a holiday of some sort on the school calendar about every 4 to 5 weeks, allowing for a 3-day weekend always on the horizon. These holidays served as goalposts; I would run hard for weeks and then collapse in joyful rest.

Then would come the long stretch of about 8 weeks between a holiday in February and Spring Vacation in April. This stretch felt cruel; in a cold and dark and wet time of year, the goalposts were far apart and the run felt endless. By Spring Break I was tired and a bit irritated. Who thought this long stretch of holidaylessness was a good idea anyway?

As Jews we understand this feeling well—although the fatigue is generally not a result of a lack of holidays, but an abundance of them: "It's Rosh Hashanah! Shana tova! Oh, but now it's Shabbat Shuva...and Yom Kippur...Shabbat again?? Wait, two more days of yomtov with Sukkot and...Shabbat and Shmini Atzeret and Simchat Torah and...Shabbat??"

Dirty laundry piles up. The vacuum cleaner has gathered dust. Mail is stacked on the counter. In Cheshvan we come to a whole month of holidaylessness—an abrupt end to a spiritual marathon. After all of this renewal and teshuva, coming to terms with our spiritual frailty, and appreciation for our community, family, tradition and faith—oh and yeah, there is food, too—we march around in a circle 7 times with our Sefer Torah, demanding that G-d save us. And then it is over. We hear the silence, shift suddenly into slow, and ask, "What now?" As Jews we can't help but to seek meaning in this stark contrast between our month of holidays and our month of holidaylessness, so we look for relevancy in the experience. We pause to reflect on the journey we completed, to allow it all to sink in. We pause to be let down to earth again. We pause and...in the pause of the reflection we realize that perhaps we can't appreciate the ordinary until it has become unordinary.

Cheshvan comes and we are children again, collapsing in joyful rest. We look out the window and watch the leaves as one by one they fall from the large Maple, carpeting the lawn in brilliant yellow. We do laundry with gratitude that there is simply time to do it. We fold white t-shirts and marvel at the feel of the cotton soft between our fingers. We vacuum the floor and notice that the rhythmic push-pull-push is a return to the sustainable tempo of ordinary life. We sit down to the stack of envelopes on the counter and realize: not one unopened letter is truly urgent. Life continues on.

Welcome to the month of Cheshvan: may we all appreciate the ordinary.







Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El





Most of our recent books have been quite personal – memoirs or novels – but now we will turn to a book asking the big questions in our world today and offering some interesting answers. Certainly not the ultimate answers, but thoughtful and challenging answers. Why is liberal democracy in crisis? Is God back? Is a new world war coming? What does the rise of Donald Trump signify? What can we do about the epidemic of fake news? Which civilization dominates the world – the West, China, Islam? Should Europe keep its doors open to immigrants? Can nationalism solve the problems of inequality and climate change? What should we do about terrorism? What should we teach our kids?

With questions that big, we must ask who this guy is. Yuval Noah Harari is an Israeli, one of three children born to a secular Jewish family with roots in Lebanon and Eastern Europe. Harari first specialized in medieval history and military history in his studies from 1993 to 1998 at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and completed a D.Phil. degree at Jesus College, Oxford. Yuval Noah Harari's career is a publishing miracle: an obscure Israeli academic wrote a Hebrew-language history of humanity *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind.* Translated into English in 2014, the book sold more than a million copies. His next book, *Homo Deus: A Brief History of Tomorrow*, was another great success, and after his book on the past and the future, he wrote and we will be reading, *21 Lessons for the 21st Century*, which deals with the present.

Harari writes: "For millennia, much of what passed for 'news' and 'facts' in human social networks were stories about miracles, angels, demons, and witches with bold reporters giving live coverage from the deepest pits of the underworld. ... When a thousand people believe some made-up story for one month, that's fake news. When a billion people believe it for a thousand years, that's a religion." Harari shows immense ambition in his intellectual enterprises and this effort is no exception. As he explains, "My agenda here is global. I look at the major forces that shape societies all over the world and that are likely to influence the future of our planet as a whole." Bill Gates commented in an article in the *New York Times:* "Harari is such a stimulating writer that even when I disagreed, I wanted to



keep reading and thinking. All three of his books wrestle with some version of the same question: What will give our lives meaning in the decades and centuries ahead?" Join us to discuss this next month.



<u>CANNABIS POLICY</u>- As our Members will be aware, the recreational use of Cannabis has been legalized by the Provincial Government as of October 17th, 2018. The Board of Directors considered the impact of this new legislation at their Board Meeting convened October 16th, 2018. At that time, the Board agreed that not only would the recreational use of Cannabis on Beth El property not be in keeping with the family values that Beth El aspires to, but the recreational use of Cannabis in public places is still prohibited, despite the new legislation.
