

Clergy Corner Hazzan Devorah Tucker-Fick

וְעַשׂוּ לִי מִקְדַשׁ וְשַׁכַנִתִּי בִּתוֹכָם

"And let them make for me a Sanctuary

That I may dwell among them."

It's February, the Month of Love: candy hearts and chocolates and Valentine's Day. And naturally...Parshat Terumah, Gd's call for the newly freed Israelites to build the Tabernacle, the place where Gd would dwell among them-Torah's great example of Divine Love.

I know what you're thinking: Valentine's Day and the instructions for the building of the Tabernacle have nothing to do with each other! But hear me out—I do believe they are related.

A couple of months ago I was approached by two members of our congregation who had purchased mezuzot for their homes. "We bought these and want to put them on our door frames, but we don't know the mezuzah prayer. Can you teach it to us? And can you tell us what this is actually supposed to be about? Is it a house blessing? It seems like maybe it's more than that?"

My response was to quote the V'ahavta:

"Hear, O Israel, the Lord is our G-d, the Lord is One: You shall love the Lord your G-d with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might. Take to heart these instructions with which I charge you this day. Teach them to your children. Recite them when you stay at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you get up. Bind them as a sign on your hand and let them serve as a symbol on your forehead; inscribe them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

If you look closely at the part in bold, you might notice that there are actually two related mitzvot in this text: mezuzah and tefillin. They are related in a couple of ways:

- 1) Both ritual objects contain within them the Shema and V'ahavta (Deuteronomy 6:4-9) written on pieces of parchment, and
- 2) Both are meant to be affixed to a dwelling: mezuzah to the rooms where we live, eat, sleep, procreate, work, and worship; and tefillin to the dwelling of our heart, mind, soul, and hand (our ability to affect physical action).

Parshat Terumah tells of G-d sharing with Moses the plan for the building of the mishkan, the portable Tabernacle: "And let them make for me a Sanctuary, that I may dwell among them." This development in our relationship with G-d in Torah suddenly is very personal and real. The Divine is no longer a force or voice to witness and fear, but has moved into physical community "with them" (us). Eventually this makom, or place of dwelling, leads to the Holy of Holies of the two Temples in Jerusalem. From the time of the mishkan in the wilderness until the destruction of Herod's Temple in CE 70, the Jewish people could look to a place of Divine Presence in the world. It was clear: G-d dwelt among us, in G-d's Sanctuary, in G-d's Holy Place.

The destruction of the Temple by the Romans changed all of that, taking the dwelling Divine Presence from us.

Or did it?

In the aftermath of the destruction of the Temple, in the construction of the Rabbinic Judaism we now know and embrace and live, it seems that the Jewish People realized that we can find dwelling places for G-d outside of a Temple—we remembered the words of G-d in the wilderness, this time not the commandment to build a physical dwelling, but instead the two mitzvot we find in our V'ahavta: "...love the Lord your G-d with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might. Take to heart these instructions... Bind them as a sign on your hand and let them serve as a symbol on your forehead; inscribe them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

By placing these signs on our dwelling places, we create a mishkan in every home, in the places we pray and come together, and where we work—wherever we may be. And when Jewish men and women lay tefillin, we bind these as a sign onto the dwelling places of our souls; we allow G-d to dwell in us, making ourselves, for G-d, into a living and breathing mishkan. These mitzvot are a sign and reminder that the Divine Presence dwells in each one of us, and in the ruach (wind) between each of us. We know in the absence of the mishkan that the Divine Spirit didn't leave us, but instead moved into our hearts and minds and revealed that WE—not buildings—are the mishkan. Our calling is to show up with open hearts, ready to serve and love and care for one another and the world we live in.

This month as we give and receive tokens of love, I encourage you to look deeply into the hearts of one another and remember that Divine one dwells within each one of us, not only in February but in every month of our lives.

Did you know?

The mitzvah of "laying" or "wrapping" tefillin fell out of popular practice for many decades in progressive Jewish circles, but recently has become much more mainstream, as non-Orthodox Jews (yes, even Reform!) have reclaimed it. And for the first time in Jewish history, the practice of laying tefillin has grown amongst women. Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El



The Lost Shetl by Max Gross

How can a book which touches all the problems of contemporary society confronting the Jewish world today also be fun to read and sometimes outright hilarious? To your surprise, it can be that when the book is the recently published *The Lost Shtetl,* winner of the National Jewish Book Award and the Jewish Fiction Award from the Association of Jewish Libraries. Described as "alive with human emo-tion, his-to-ry and provoca-tive ques-tions that call for debate, Max Gross's first nov-el is a dis-cussion group's dream." After getting into, but not yet finished reading the book, I am prepared to agree completely, to look forward to finishing the book, and to encourage you to read the book and to join us for discussion on March 8th.

In the time dislocation tradition of Mark Twain's A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court, or more closely, of Michael Chabon's The Yiddish Policeman's Union

which was a Book Club selection some years ago, the book is a comic fantasy which – although it recognizes that Jewish life disappeared from Poland and Eastern Europe because its residents were systematically wiped out and real, uninterrupted Jewish cultural persistence from pre-war Poland is a practical impossibility - asks what if there were a *shtetl* hidden deep in the Polish forests that survived, undiscovered by Nazis, and untouched by the last 80 or more years of European history? And what might happen if that hidden Jewish village suddenly resurfaced in 21st century Poland? What if eighty years lat-er there was a young woman from that reli-gious vil-lage who insists she be divorced from her hus-band? What if there was a young man, an insignif-i-cant orphan, sent away from that vil-lage to find her when she dis-ap-pears? What if this sto-ry sudden-ly grows much larg-er to encom-pass mat-ters of assim-i-la-tion, anti-semitism, effects of his-to-ry on indi

-vid-u-als and col-lec-tive con-scious-ness, polit-i-cal lies which take hold, gov-ern-men-tal bureau-cra-cy, social class, eco-nom-ic choic-es, reli-gion, divi-sions with-in the Jew-ish com-mu-ni-ty, sur-vival, fam-i-ly ties, and love...and you care about them all? If these questions speak to you, then this book is for you to read and enjoy.

The author was born in New York City in 1978 and is the son of two writers. He attended Saint Ann's School and Dartmouth College. He worked for 10 years at *The New York Post* before becoming Editor in Chief of *Commercial Observer*. He previously wrote a book about dating called *From Schlub to Stud* but has since become a husband and father.
