

## Clergy Corner April 2023

Then Miriam the prophet, Aaron's sister, took a timbrel in her hand, and all the women followed her, with timbrels and dancing. Miriam sang to them:

"Sing to the Lord, for he is highly exalted. Both horse and driver he has hurled into the sea." ~Exodus 15:20-21~

We are told that after the parting of the Sea, Moses and the Israelites sang praises to G-d, who rescued them from Pharoah's army and delivered them from slavery. Torah then tells us that the women took their timbrels (or tambourines) and sang and danced before G-d and the entire Nation. We therefore know that at the time of our Torah, the voices of women were expressed in song, and were heard by the entire Nation of Israel: there is no record in this Torah narrative of men objecting to the voices of women praising G-d openly in what would eventually become words which we chant in Torah and in our liturgy.

There is something significant here: the singing of Miriam and the women before the Nation occurred at the moment of our Redemption! We must recognize what a powerful statement this is, that in the telling of our story of Exodus and Freedom, the first thing we did as a Free People was to pray together in song, with the voices of the women not only heard by men, but elevated by instruments and dancing, legitimized to the height of being recorded in Torah.

Congregation Beth El is proudly, enthusiastically, and unapologetically Egalitarian. In fact, it is my understanding that of all of the reasons we came into being as a community, Egalitarianism was at the forefront of the values which prompted and inspired the founding members to form this community, a place where not only their sons could learn Torah and tefillah and count in a minyan, but their daughters as well. Our history is one of a community imagined and brought to realization, so that the Jewish People in Windsor can have a place where every Jew has a voice and can sing their own song--something that we continue here at Beth El and for the Windsor community to this day.

Slaves are given no voice, and so this Song of the Sea is a critical and pivotal moment in our story: we raise our voices because we are free, we raise our voices in an act of becoming fully human, we raise our voices because we are no longer slaves, but a People who belong to G-d. Indeed, nothing speaks more to the Pesach story of what it is to be free than to be given a voice.

As we enter into our Passover Season, let us sing the song of a Free People, let us hear the voices of not only women and men, but of all Jews: the voices of Jews in the LGBTQ community, Jews of patrilineal descent, converts to Judaism, Jews of colour, and Jews with disabilities. Not one of those voices should be silenced, not one should be lost to the harmony of our song, not one is greater than another—all matter, all must count in our minyan, our Song of the Sea. This is who we are: Beth El, a Congregation of Israel who sings the Song of Freedom and Redemption, a song made of us all.

## Clergy Corner April 2023

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"Sing to the Lord, for he is highly exalted. Both horse and driver he has hurled into the sea." ~Exodus 15:20-21~

Miriam and the Women sang, danced and played tambourines--but no tambourines as we know them today have been recovered from the Biblical era. Instead, ancient pottery figurines of women with small handheld drums have been found in Israel in places such as Achzib, Megiddo, and Beth-shean. This ancient tambourine was likely a simple wooden hoop with an animal skin stretched across it.

Tambourines were played by women on festive occasions, accompanied by singing and dancing. Tanakh tells us that when the Israelite leader Jephthah returned home after an important victory in battle, his daughter ran to meet him "with tambourine playing and dancing." -Judges 11:34:1 Psalm 150 says, "Praise Yah with nevel and kinnor." The kinnor, most often referred to as a "harp" or "lyre," was an instrument commonly used in ancient Israel and a favourite of King David. Scholars have over 30 representations of the kinnor from depictions found on ancient rock walls, coins, mosaics, plaques, and seals. The form of the instrument varied through the centuries. The player held it in his arms and strummed or plucked the strings with his fingers or with a plectrum.

The nevel was similar to the kinnor. There is uncertainty as to how many strings the nevel had, how large it was, and whether it was plucked or strummed. Scholars, however, believe that both the nevel and the kinnor could be carried about by the musician--mobile instruments that would have been on hand anywhere, like guitars in modern times!

This female figurine of a tambourine player is part of a group of similar clay figurines found in Tel es-Sa'idiyeh and Tel Jemeh in modern-day Israel. Pottery of female musicians of this sort probably formed part of a toy band. This figure is dated to the 9th century BCE, during the time of the founding of the town that would become Jerusalem. (The British Museum, London)



## Jewish Book Club Sponsored by Congregation Beth El



#### The Storyteller by Jodi Picoult



Although this book was published ten years ago, it was in the news only a few weeks ago when it was removed from the school library in a Florida town under Gov. DeSantis' new regulations as being unsuitable for high school readers. Yet this is a novel that was #1 on the New York Times Best Seller list for weeks after its publication, and Jodi Picoult has published 28 successful novels and has been honoured with more awards than I have space for. Clearly *The Storyteller* remains important because its themes remain important. *The Storyteller takes* place in a small town in New Hampshire and centers on a troubled young baker, Sage Singer. She meets an old man, Josef Weber, in her grief recovery group. After they become friends, he confides to her that he was an SS soldier and asks her to not only forgive him for his sins, but to kill him so that he doesn't have to keep living a lie. Sage replies that she is an atheist but is Jewish, and has a grandmother who survived

Auschwitz. She reports Josef to local authorities and Leo Stein, a Nazi hunter from the Department of Justice comes to investigate the claim. It may sound like other Holocaust stories, but, as Leo points out, these stories must be told over and over again, until history stops repeating itself. Even though Josef Weber is over 90 years old, punishing him may stop someone today from committing genocide. For us as readers, this well written story goes beyond the grandmother's story of survival to examine 25-year-old Sage's complex life and relationships in Westerbrook, New Hampshire.

I would really like to know more about Jodi Picoult, but she has done a good job of maintaining the confidentiality of her own and her family's lives. But she we do know that she grew up in an idyllic small town on eastern Long Island, and has described her family as "non-practicing Jewish". I'd love to know more, especially in relation to this book. Picoult studied creative writing at Princeton University and graduated in 1987. Like so many English majors, she worked in advertising for a while, and then earned a M.Ed. from Harvard University and did some teaching before becoming a full-time successful writer. She has asked: "why is our



country so contentiously divided along the fault line of religion — a construct meant to unite, but that more often creates schisms? All the hot-button political issues in this country — abortion, reproductive rights, gay rights, the death penalty — all have ideological roots in religious beliefs that are often archaic or that have been cherry-picked to support specific points of view."

On the Shabbat during Passover, we are reminded of the age-old desire to know God. Moses implores God to let him see God. While God will not allow Moses to see God's face, God tells Moses, "I will make My goodness pass before you..." Perhaps we experience the divine presence through the goodness we create in the world. The Torah then sets forth the thirteen attributes of God, among them that God is compassionate, gracious, slow to anger and abounding in kindness. By emulating these very attributes, we create the goodness which allows us to know God.

Sh'mini עַמִינָי

The Eight [Day]

Leviticus 9:1-11:47

April 15, 2023

Aaron and his sons follow Moses' instructions and offer sacrifices so that God will forgive the people. (9:1-24)

Two of Aaron's sons, Nadab and Abihu, offer "alien fire" to God. God punishes these two priests by killing them immediately. (10:1-3)

God forbids Moses, Aaron, and his surviving sons from mourning but commands the rest of the people to do so. Priests are told not to drink alcohol before entering the sacred Tabernacle and are further instructed about making sacrifices. (10:4-20)

Laws are given to distinguish between pure and impure animals, birds, fish, and insects. (11:1-47)

Bearing Seed / A Leper

Leviticus 12:1-15:33



God describes the rituals of purification for a woman after childbirth. (12:1-8)

God sets forth the methods for diagnosing and treating a variety of skin diseases, including tzara-at (a leprous affection), as well as those for purifying clothing. (13:1-59)

Priestly rituals to cure tzara-at when it afflicts humans are described. (14:1-32)

Rituals to rid dwelling places of tzara-at are presented. (14:33-57)

The parashah denotes male impurities resulting from a penile discharge or seminal emission. (15:1-18)

The parashah concludes with accounts of female impurities caused by a discharge of blood. (15:19-33)
